READ

Romans 7:15-25

REFLECT

Continuing our study of the Apostles' Creed: I believe in...the forgiveness of sins.

First, we'll consider sin, then our need for forgiveness.

1. The IDEA of sin

Qu: What are common misconceptions inside and outside the church with the idea of sin?

2. The DENIAL of sin

We hear others say or might have even thought ourselves, "I'm basically a good person."

Qu: Do we weigh out actions or attitudes and based on that decide we are "basically" good?

3. The ACKNOWLEDGEMENT of sin

But I need something *more*! For if I know the law but still can't keep it, and if the power of sin within me keeps sabotaging my best intentions, I obviously need help! I realize that I don't have what it takes. I can will it, but I can't do it. I decide to do good, but I don't *really* do it; I decide not to do bad, but then I do it anyway. My decisions, such as they are, don't result in actions. Something has gone wrong deep within me and gets the better of me every time.

— Romans 7:17-20 (MSG)

Paul was quick to admit, that though he knew God's law, what was good and what was evil, right or wrong, there was a war within him. He needed help!

Qu: Why is it difficult to admit your own faults and failures?

Is it possible to go through life without the weight of regret, a day we wish we could live over again, words we would take back, a voice we failed to listen to? Our failure to do what is right and to refrain from sin reminds us of our need for forgiveness.

THE HOLY SPIRIT

The forgiveness of sins begins with an act of the Holy Spirit:

"And when he comes, he will convict the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment".

—John 16:8

By the Spirit's conviction we understand as David the Psalmist wrote:

"Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight." — Ps 51:4

We grasp our need for forgiveness:

If you, O Lord, should mark iniquities, O Lord, who could stand? But with you there is forgiveness, that you may be feared**. — Ps 130:3-4

Paul said:

"Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!"

Qu: As Paul honestly wrote about at his own sin and failure, he concluded with thanksgiving and worship? How does acknowledgement of your sin take you to a place of gratitude?

RESPOND& PRAY

Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working. — James 5:16

Pray for one another, for a deeper understanding, of you own sin, a greater honesty regarding you sin, and, in light of this, the humility to confess to one another and pray for one another.
